HOMETOWN PRIDE has proven it can enhance community cultural and economic vitality – strengthening the community and increasing its chance for not simply survival but growth with increased pride. The program walks alongside qualifying Iowa communities to provide technical and professional coaching assistance. The goal is to deliver a sense of stability and empowerment so that communities can implement sustainable plans and programs.

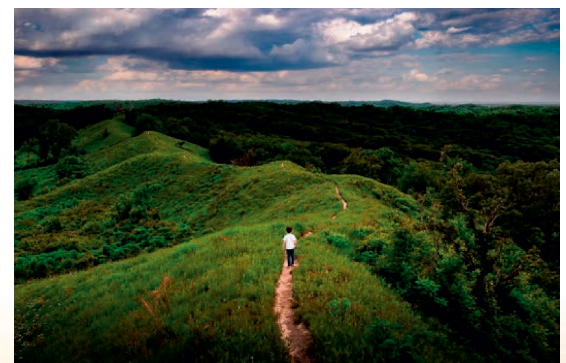

## **KEEP IOWA BEAUTIFUL TO AWARD SCHOLARSHIPS**

Keep Iowa Beautiful (KIB) will award three \$1,000 scholarships to Iowa high school seniors in 2020 who plan to enroll in an Iowa college or university.

The scholarships are in honor of three pioneers in KIB's 20-year history:

**Bob Byers--Educator.** Through Bob's leadership, KIB's Litter-Free School Campus program was started in NW Iowa. His dedication to young people and environmental concerns was a driving force encouraging young people to help improve their community.

**William Fultz—KIB Founding Board Member and artist.** Bill started an advertising agency that became the largest agricultural advertising agency in the world.

**Gerald Schnepf—KIB Founding Executive Director.** Gerry's career spanned 50 years of making Iowa a better place to live, work and raise a family.

The Byers scholarship is supporting high school students who plan to enroll and study environmental science, community development, landscape architecture or architecture (historical emphasis) or community planning and sustainability.

The Schnepf scholarship will be awarded to a senior who has a record of community service and a desire to continue to support and contribute to the enhancement of the place they live and work. College programs could include community & regional planning and volunteer management.

The Fultz scholarship will be awarded to a senior planning on studying communications, public relations and/or marketing.

"KIB seeks to foster positive values in younger generations and reinforce them in older generations. We encourage respect for home, neighborhood, community and state," said Kevin Techau, KIB Executive Director.

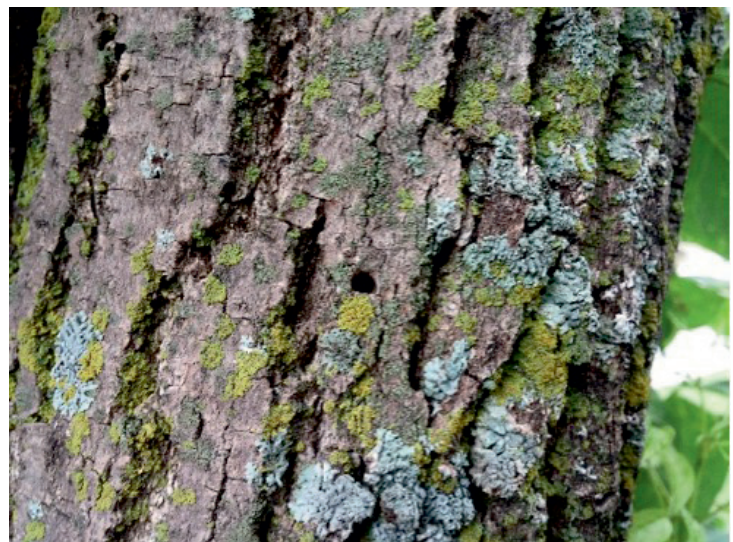
## HOW ARE THE TREES IN YOUR COMMUNITY?

TREES FOREVER

Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is an invasive beetle from Asia that infects and kills ash trees. It has been detected in 69 Iowa Counties so far and poses a significant threat to the estimated 52 million ash trees in our state forests and over 3 million ash trees in our towns and cities. While some chemical treatments are available for healthy trees, the simple reality is that EAB will kill most of the ash trees in Iowa. While it is true that cold temperatures (-30 air temperature) can kill some of the beetles it will not stop the spread of this pesky little bug in any meaningful way.

Many resources exist that can help homeowners and community members cope with this destructive pest. Trees Forever has some useful EAB information found here <http://www.treesforever.org/EAB> along with links for other great resources. The Iowa DNR has a very nice website that provides a wealth of information including what EAB looks like, community and landowner resources – which include how to find a certified pesticide applicator or certified arborist to talk with about treatment or diagnosing a tree, as well as how to find your district forester for more information or questions about tree health. <https://www.iowadnr.gov/Conservation/Forestry/Forest-Health/Emerald-Ash-Borer> The IA Dept. of Ag. and Land Stewardship (IDALS) is another fantastic resource through their Iowa Tree Pests website at <http://www.iowatreepests.com/> here you can track the spread of EAB through maps and learn about other threats to our forests and woodlands.

## DERELICT BUILDING GRANTS

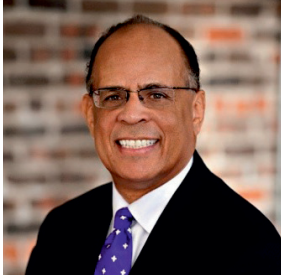
The Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is now accepting applications for the 2020 Derelict Building Grant Program. The program promotes the reuse or recycling of building materials from dilapidated buildings in communities of 5,000 residents or less. The 2019 grant recipients were announced last May and included 13 awards from several thousand dollars up to \$70,000.

Financial assistance includes asbestos removal, building demolition/renovation and other environmental services. The application period will remain open through Feb. 20, 2020. A committee made up of representatives from the DNR, Iowa Society of Solid Waste Operations, Iowa Recycling Association, Iowa Economic Development Authority and Keep Iowa Beautiful will review the grant applications and select the 2020 grant recipients.
